Time to Recharter Your Unit for 2013 Most Three Rivers units do it in January

Once a year every unit must renew its charter with National and with its sponsoring organization. Step 1 must be done using National's on-line system, where you make additions, deletions, and corrections to your roster. Step 2 is to print the final roster and have it signed by the sponsor ("chartered organization") and Scoutmaster or Cubmaster. Step 3 is to give it to your District Exec along with a check to cover all fees.

Earlier this month District Exec Oliris Ramos prepared one packet for each active unit and sent an e-mail asking for someone to come to Oakland or to a Roundtable to pick it up. She said, "As a last resort, we can arrange a meeting point or I can drop it off at your home or work place."

The packet contains your unit's new access code, which changes every year. You can then start on Step 1 using this link to the on-line site:

https://scoutnet.scouting.org/ucrs/

Click on "First Time User!"

Translation: "This is the first time I'm using my new access code." You can do some work, log out, then log back in later as "Returning User."

In addition to the normal fixes, such as correcting spelling errors and noting changed addresses or phone numbers, Scoutmasters can use the "promote" feature to add new Webelos into the troop and to convert 18-year olds into Assistant Scoutmasters.

The on-line system will also compute the rechartering fee for you. IGNORE THIS NUMBER and recalculate it yourself using the worksheet on the NNJC web page. The problem is our New Jersey "insurance surcharge." Instead of the on-line figure of \$15 per person, the correct amount is \$20 per person, plus an extra \$40 for the unit (up from \$20) last year). Then add on Boys' Life subscriptions at \$12 each for the year. Note that some people don't have to pay a fee, such as the head of the chartered organization (priest, rabbi, president, etc.), Tiger parents, and "Scout parents."

If you used the on-line system to add any new adults or youth, you still have to submit the usual application forms to make them official, and include those forms with the other rechartering paperwork. For adults, also attach a copy of their Youth Protection certification. If your unit is applying for the Journey to Excellence Award, include that as well (see following article)

The requirement for Youth Protection Training

YPT certification for adults is mandatory. A summary page will come up during the on-line processing and tell you which adults it thinks are not certified. Also watch for adults whose certification is older than 2 years. Contact them now and tell them to log into MyScouting.org and sit through the training, which takes about 45 minutes.

Why January?

When NNJC was formed in 1999, it asked all units to shift their expiration date to January in order to make things easier for the Registrar and his staff. National introduced on-line rechartering in 2005, first making it optional and then mandatory. •

"Journey To Excellence" Unit Award This is the second year for the JTE award

This award is a feather in the cap of any unit that earns it, giving you bragging rights and a new streamer for your flagpole.

The award may be earned at bronze, silver, or gold levels based on a point system. For example, a Cub pack that schedules 3 outdoor events earns 75 points, 4 earns 150, and 5 events earn 300 points. A

Scout troop earns 50, 100, or 200 points for scheduling 4, 7, or 9 camping trips. For both packs and troops, a total of 1,600 points gets you the gold award.

To earn the award, units earn points by showing good numbers for new boys recruited and old boys retained. There must be a good program for indoor meetings, outdoor events, service projects, good leadership, and good finances.

Cub packs have a "leadership planning" requirement that says, "By May 31, the pack committee either recruits or confirms pack and den leadership for the next [school] year." Luckily, selecting a Den Leader for next September's non-existent Tiger Den is not included, since a footnote specifies unit position codes "CM", "DLs" "WLs" but omits "TL" that is, Cubmaster, Den Leaders, Webelos Den Leaders, but not Tiger Cub Den Leader.

Service projects should be scheduled with the results recorded into the "Journey to Excellence" website. Note that all units are encouraged to use this site, even those not planning to earn the award. In their public relations, National likes to tell how many millions of man-hours Scouts have spent doing community service.

To earn the award, obtain a copy of the "Scorecard" form, fill it out, and turn it in with your other forms when you recharter your unit.

District Bowl-a-Thon (Dec 28) A good turnout at three different locations

Some 232 Cubs, Scouts, and parents put on their bowling shoes at the District's annual HFW Memorial Bowl-a-Thon. Unlike other events that take place in a single location, the Bowl-a-Thon is unique in that participants have a choice of three, whichever is more convenient. However, start times are staggered in order to allow organizer Mark Wrightington to drive from one to the other in order to monitor all three. The locations were Montvale, Elmwood Park, and (new this year) Union City.

The numbers: 31 different units signed up, representing 23 different towns. The total of 232 was down from last year's 265, with most of the decrease at the Elmwood Park location. The 14 who came to

the new Union City location were not enough to make up the difference. Mark's best guess is that turnout suffered because the event was run on a Friday just prior to a long weekend.

Union City: New this year was the addition of Union City, as part of the Activities Committee's ongoing effort to encourage more participation from the units in the southern portion of the large Three Rivers District. Mark was very pleased with the cooperation given by the owners of the Bowl Rite lanes, who are accustomed to hosting much larger group events. When the day was over, they offered to also host any local Scout unit that might want to run its own bowling event during the year.

A memorial fund-raiser: The HFW Bowl-a-Thon was named to honor the memory of Mark's late son, Harold F. Wrightington, who was a Cub and Scout and loved to bowl. Harold was 12½ when he passed away in 2008, having reached First Class with Palisades Park Troop 379. Mark estimated that about \$1,700 was raised in Harold's honor.

Editor's note: The "EDGE" acronym stands for "Explain, Demonstrate, Guide, Enable." It's the 4-step teaching method that Scouts and leaders are always expected to use when teaching a skill. Boy Scouts must use the EDGE method as one of the requirements for reaching Tenderfoot, and again for reaching Life Scout. By the way, "EDGE" is trademarked, so it's actually EDGETM.

At the first World Jamboree in 1920, Lord Baden-Powell presented the "Scout Cup", to Scotland for having the best display. We honor that tradition, as we celebrate the anniversary of Scouting, by conducting the 2nd annual Three Rivers District Window Display Contest.

Each unit may develop a display of their choice, based on the skills and resources of the unit. The display should ideally be a "window display" in a local business. However, a library, town hall, school, church, or other public site may also be used. The display must be in place for the entire Scout Anniversary week of Feb 3-9.

Units are free to develop their own unique methods to present their information. However, each display must include the following elements:

• Unit Information:

Troop/Pack Number Contact Person - phone and e-mail Meeting location, day, time How old is the unit (tenure)

- Chartered Organization name
- Your Troop/Pack flag
- American flag
- Information about advancement (Tiger to Arrow of Light, Tenderfoot to Eagle, etc.)
- Information about activities your unit participated in (Pinewood, Klondike, Philmont, Floodwood, Conservation Weekend, etc.)

Prizes will be awarded for displays that best represent Scouting. There will be 1st and 2nd place gift cards for Cubs, Scouts, and Venturing, for a total of six. Winners will be announced at the February Roundtable.

The Contest Committee will select 5 finalists for each unit type and then determine the winners. The tiebreaker will be the unit that submitted first.

The Window Display Contest is an excellent way to show your unit's "Scout Spirit", commemorate Scout Anniversary Week, and recruit new members.

Start planning your display now -- it's never too early to be prepared! •

Recognitions for Troop/Pack/Crew Adults They show up as "knots" on your uniform

The best Scout units ensure that their adult leaders also receive recognition, such as presenting them with National's "Training" awards and "Key" awards:

Training Awards

Den Leader Training Award **Cub Scouting Training Award Boy Scouting Training Award** Varsity Scouting Training Award Venturing Training Award

"Key" Awards

Cubmaster Key Scoutmaster Key Coach Key Advisor Key

Also: "Commissioner" Awards

There are 9 awards for Commissioners, ranging from the "Unit Commissioner Key Arrowhead Award" up to "Distinguished Commissioner Service Award."

Rich Curran passed on this "secret" of how to earn the award and its knot for your uniform: "All you have to do is fill out the application and turn it in! It's that simple!" More precisely, you download the form from National's website, check the check boxes, ask your Committee Chair to sign, and then turn it in to Rich (see below).

Finally, decide when to make the presentation. Possibilities are a Court of Honor or Blue-and-Gold banquet, during a District Roundtable, or during the fancy District Recognition Dinner in April.

New this year: "Unit Leader Award of Merit"

This award requires the unit's Committee Chair to submit a nomination to the Council, which approves and processes the award. Submit the nomination to Rich, who will forward it to the Council. There are only 7 requirements, and, with one exception, most well run units should be able to meet them easily. The exception will be a Boy Scout troop aiming to meet this requirement:

5. Effectively use the advancement method so that at least 60 percent of the unit's youth have advanced at least once during the last 12 months.

Scout "Knots" as Awards and Recognitions

Scout "Knots" are small cloth badges that adult Scouters can sew onto their uniform shirts. They go just above the left breast pocket and are analogous to the award ribbons that servicemen or policemen wear on their uniforms. Each badge has the same embroidered square knot, but they come in different colors so you can tell what the award was for. For example, an Eagle Scout knot is red-white-and-blue. One exception is a simple overhand knot representing the District Award of Merit.

Why bother? One response came from Bill Evans, who supervises square knots as part of his job as Director of Youth Development. He said, "It's an

opportunity to symbolize the dedication of our volunteers." Bryan Wendell, writing in Scouting magazine, added, "To earn a coveted square knot, Scouters must demonstrate continued leadership and service to the program's ideals."

Another response came from TRD's Training Chair Warren Dressler, who passed on this anecdote about BSA Regional President Hab Butler, the featured speaker at the upcoming Wood Badge Dining Out event. Warren did a quick review of Butler's accomplishments, called him "an awesome guy," and said. "He has enough knots to reach his shoulder if he wanted. This summer someone asked him why he wore the knots." Butler's response was, "I never used to wear the square knots until I was at a Jamboree and was told, 'You really should wear them. It will give you credibility when you're talking to people who don't know you."" •

OA Elections

Three changes to the election process

The Order of the Arrow is an honor organization within Scouting, and election into the OA is a great way to give recognition to the best Scouts in your troop. Adults are also eligible. Three changes were recently announced.

- 1. Troops and crews should now request an election using the Council's website. The end result will be an OA election team coming to the troop's weekly meeting to handle the entire process.
- 2. The eligibility requirements for adults have been changed with an eye towards increasing adult membership. The unit committee may nominate one adult for every three youth elected (rounded up).
- 3. The unit committee may also nominate the Scoutmaster or Varsity Team Coach without regard to the one-third limit.

Shawnee likes the Scout weekend because it allows them to extend their season by one extra week. Girl Scout troops are also invited, and siblings and other family members are all welcome.
